

## SENTENCE CONNECTORS

Connectors help you carry over a thought from one sentence to another, from one idea to another, or from one paragraph to another with words or phrases so that there are no sudden jumps or breaks between ideas. Here is a list of some common connectors (it is best to check the dictionary or a grammar book to see how they are used) :

### TO ADD/ TO LIST

and	in addition	first of all	third	then
also	in addition to	to begin with	thirdly	as well
besides	moreover	in the first place	finally	as well as
further	first	second	lastly	too
furthermore	firstly	secondly	next	

### TO EXPRESS REASON

### TO EXPRESS RESULT

If the project fails, it will affect **not only** our department, **but also** the whole organization.  
This washing machine was **not only** expensive, it's unreliable **as well**.  
We can **either** eat now **or** after the show. It's up to you.  
My doctor told me I should **neither** smoke **nor** drink.
- 2) He misses all of us, but **above all** he longs to see his family again.  
**Above all/ most importantly**, don't forget to come here on time.
- 3) **To some extent** (Partly), she was responsible for the accident.
- 4) **To a great extent/To a large extent** (Mostly) people go on holiday there to enjoy the good weather.
- 5) **In accordance with** your wishes, I changed my plan.
- 6) The Richter Scale measures the intensity of earthquakes **in terms of** earth movement, while the Mercalli Scale measures the intensity of earthquakes **in terms of** effects.
- 7) A trip to New Zealand is **out of the question** (=impossible) this year.
- 8) We cannot adopt your plan for irrigating the area. First of all, we have to **take into account/take into consideration** the obstacles that must be overcome.  
**Considering** his age, he has made excellent progress in his studies.  
**In view of** the strong market, she invested in stocks.
- 9) Why he did it is **beyond** my comprehension.  
We can do nothing **beyond** what we have done already.
- 10) **Depending on** what results are required, different methods are used.
- 11) The journalist wrote some articles **concerning** prisons and prisoners.  
A small problem has arisen **in connection with** the renewal of the visa.
- 12) Erbil, **like** her sister, is very eager to learn new things.  
**Unlike** Ali, his sister is quite pessimistic.
- 13) **As far as we're concerned**, you can go whenever you want.  
He had been so ill for so long that, **from his point of view**, death was a blessing.
- 14) The tax increases **in proportion to/in relation to** the amount you earn.
- 15) Plant disease, **together with** a prolonged drought, has ruined most of the crops.
